

One of the cornerstones of the GWRRA Rider Education Program is the Rider Course. We are excited about the improvements our rider courses have undergone in the last two years. All the curriculums have been updated to be "user friendly" and more oriented to adult learners. Your experience at one of our Rider Courses should no longer make you feel as if you were back in Junior High School listening to the teacher drone on. We feel that the Rider Courses we now offer as part of GWRRA's "World Class" Rider Education Program are on par with others in the industry.

GWRRA currently offers "On-Bike" training for traditional 2-wheel motorcycles (ARC), most styles of trikes (TRC), motorcycles with the add-on kits (AORC), and sidecar rigs (SRC) as well as two wheel (TC) and three-wheel motorcycles (TTRC) pulling trailers. All

of our full Rider Courses offer a classroom component covering the findings from the "Hurt Report" showing that accident involved motorcyclists were deficient in the skills of cornering, swerving, and stopping. The classrooms also discuss, in depth, the mental aspect of riding.

On the range skills involving stopping, swerving, and cornering are practiced using the participant's own motorcycle.

In addition to the courses with a full classroom, GWRRA also offers a 2-wheel Recertification class (ARC-R) and a 3-wheel Recertification class (TRC-R). All GWRRA courses count as "approved rider courses" for the Rider Education Levels Program. However, the Recertification courses must be alternated with full courses that include a classroom.

We know that there are times when GWRRA courses are difficult to find in your District. An acceptable alternative is to enroll in one of the courses offered as part of your state Motorcycle Safety Program. Most of these programs offer courses from the Motorcycle Safety Foundation.

Some states (Oregon, Ohio, Idaho, and others) offer courses they have developed on their own and are equally as good. A list of the courses that GWRRA approves for use in the Levels Program can be found on the Rider Education website in the Toolbox.

The Honda shop in Paducah, FDR, had an open house on April 28 and they were offering demo rides on the new 2018 Goldwing and Goldwing Tour. So, what was I supposed to do? Not ride them? Nope. I rode both since the Tour had the 6-speed standard transmission and the Goldwing had the DCT transmission.

Jennie went with me on the Goldwing Tour and I was impressed with the agility and noticeable loss of weight of the new bike. I thought the shifting was exceptionally smooth and bike was comfortable to sit on, although I was limited to about 30 miles on

this test ride. In a church parking lot, I started bringing the bike in to tighter and tighter circles and it laid right in there. Any more of those tight circles and I would have gotten dizzy. Jennie was less impressed, I guess, since when I asked her how she liked it she said, "It's ok. A bike is a bike." But there might have been a more detailed evaluation if we'd put on 300 miles instead of 30. The lack of storage space is concerning to us.

Right now, we can pack our 2006 Wing with everything we need for a week or more by adding a Kuryakyn bag on the trunk rack and a small carrier that fits on the trailer hitch with a bag on it. I'm sure we would adjust to the smaller carrying capacity, but Honda admits that they tailored the new bike to the 2-3-day rider and not the long-haul rider. You can look at the design of the new Wings and see that they are targeting a different clientele than those who currently ride and like the larger Wing. But remember when cars started getting smaller for improved gas mileage? Remember that "boat" your folks used to drive? That huge Oldsmobile or Plymouth that would sit 3-4 people across the bench seats? We see those old models doing down the road now and wonder why we thought we needed cars that huge. The same may be said of our Wings in a few years. And we may see more Wings pulling trailers.

One thing that impressed me about the new Wing is the technology that has gone in to the cockpit. While I didn't get a chance to play with everything on my 30-mile ride, I've read quite a bit about it and, being somewhat of a gadget guy, I think I would be enjoy the improvements up front. The electric windshield alone was a great addition. The technology shouldn't be intimidating to anyone because like your computer, you can use just what you want to use and ignore the rest. Don't want to use the CarPlay feature? Don't use it. Hate navigation? Don't go to that screen. Just use what you want to use.

Finally, I rode the DCT model and while I found the transmission did everything Honda said it would do and while I can see how so many people love it, I preferred the manual transmission. That's just me. Practically everyone else I asked about it preferred it over the manual transmission. I did find that when you switch the mode from Tour to Sport that bike will flat jump out from under you. Crotch rockets beware...the new Wing will eat your lunch in Sport mode.

So, is a new Goldwing Tour in my future? I never say never but I don't see one being in my garage any time soon. While a new machine would be nice, there's absolutely nothing wrong with my 2006. It does everything I want a bike to do...for now.
